Armando started sailing years ago; Tatiana, now 20, was his crew. Because Armando was himself learning to sail a Hobie Cat, understandably, Tatiana's love for the sport was somewhat modi-

fied. She soon turned her crewing duties over to her younger sister, Pamela. Since then, the tables have turned; Armando Sr. now crews for Pamela—she a rising star in both Junior and Women's Hobie racing. Meanwhile, son Armando was also learning to sail. The NAHCA connection with the Noriegas became even stronger in LaRochelle, France where Armando Jr. was crewing for his father in the IYRU World Championships. Most of the family was in France for that event. Full family in attendance is a Noriega trademark. The family travels together. If you see one Noriega on the beach, you won't have to look far before finding the others—most of them in wet suits and harnesses, ready to jump on a Hobie 16.

He effectively convinces many sailors to travel to and take part in events—be they in Mexico, Guatemala, Puerto Rico, Venezuela, the U.S.A., or other locations around the world.
